

Sphagnum platyphyllum



ne of the most base-demanding sphagna, it occurs in base-rich flushes within a matrix of heathland or moorland, mainly in high-rainfall areas. Typical associates are Carex demissa, C. panicea, C. pulicaris, Erica tetralix, Eriophorum angustifolium, Bryum pseudotriquetrum and Scorpidium spp. It also grows on wetter ground in soaks with Hypericum elodes and Potamogeton polygonifolius. In many of its localities it must become desiccated during droughts; this may be an ecological factor that favours its occurrence. Altitudinal range: 5-750 m.

Dioicous; sex organs and capsules have not been observed in Britain or Ireland.

After 2000, several bryologists learnt to recognise this rather inconspicuous species, which was much overlooked in the



past. Given its rather continental distribution in mainland Europe, its western tendency in Britain and Ireland is unexpected.

Circumpolar Boreal-montane. Iceland and northern Fennoscandia south to the mountains of C and S Europe. Northern Asia and N America, present in continental interiors; disjunct in Costa Rica.
