7. BIOLOGICAL RECORDING GROUP FOR WALES: RECORDING TECHNIQUES COURSE

The above group, with the kind co-operation of the Field Studies Council, is organizing two biological recording techniques courses at the Drapers!

Field Centre, Rhyd-y-Creuau, North Wales, during the period May 22 - 29, 1974.

The full course, lasting throughout the whole period, will provide a multidisciplinary approach to methods used in recording a wide range of animal and plant groups. The course is open to professional biologists wishing to widen their experience, and to amateur naturalists wishing to gain sufficient grounding in techniques to enable them to assist in recording programmes. There is also a short course, during the Spring Holiday weekend (May 24 - 27), to provide a crash course for beginners looking for an outline knowledge from which to take up biological recording.

Because the Group wishes to stimulate biological recording among the residents of Wales, preference will be given to these until March 1, 1974. Thereafter, vacant places can be filled by any applicants.

Cost, including full board, accommodation and tuition, is £22.00 for the full course and £11.10 for the weekend course. Further details can be obtained from the Keeper of Zoology, National Museum of Wales, Cardiff, CF1 3NP.

8. JOSEPH HENRY GARFIELD PETERKEN (24.3.1893 - 13.9.1973)

It is with regret that we have to announce the death of Mr J. H. G. Peterken who had been a member of the B.B.S. since 1939. He became Treasurer of the Society in 1946, a position he held for 20 years, and was President from 1968-69. We record our gratitude to Mr Peterken for all he did for the Society. Under his Will the B.B.S. is bequeathed his herbarium of mosses and liverworts, and related 35 mm transparencies.

9. DUPLICATES OF JERSEY BRYOPHYTES

Our member, Miss E. H. du Feu, still has available for distribution to interested beginners duplicates of Jersey bryophytes (checked by B.B.S. referees), and also specimens received through the B.B.S. annual exchange in earlier years. Requests for specimens, accompanied by a Commonwealth Reply Coupon to cover the postage of 3p (as British stamps are not valid in the Channel Isles), should be sent to Miss E. 10. DISTRIBUTION MAPS SCHEME

Although there are at least some records from 68% of the British 10 km squares, there is still a great need for further recording. The following counties or areas are particularly poorly worked: Cheshire, Gloucester, Huntingdon, Northampton, Nottingham, Shropshire, S. Lancashire, Stafford, Wiltshire, Worcester, Brecon, Cardigan, Pembroke, Aberdeen, Banff, Caithness, E. Inverness, E. Sutherland, Hebrides, Moray, S. W. Scotland. Only about one-third of the Irish squares has been worked. A situation map will be published in July 1974.

Completed cards, returned to Dr Smith, will be replaced free of charge.

Reprints of Distribution Maps. A limited number of sets of distribution maps published in the <u>Transactions of the British Bryological Society</u> and in the <u>Journal of Bryology</u> is still available. Each set consists of 159 maps and costs £3.40 post free from Dr Smith. Standing orders for maps as they are published may be made.

11. PROVISIONAL BRYOPHYTE ATLAS

The Biological Records Centre has kindly offered to publish a provisional distribution atlas of about 100 of the more frequent species of British bryophytes.

Sufficient data have now accumulated to make this a feasible proposition, and it has been decided to take up the offer. Parts of the British Isles are as yet underworked so the maps will not be complete, but they will give a reasonable picture of the distribution of the species in Britain. It is not intended that these should be the final maps: it is hoped that a complete atlas of British bryophytes will eventually be published.

Species chosen for the provisional atlas have been

- (1) those with a mainly southern distribution (viz. from that part of Britain that is best worked),
- (2) those with a marked western or northern distribution (for which records are readily available),
- (3) a few previously mapped species for which more records have accumulated,
 - (4) a few that individual members have requested.

Records will be obtained from field record cards, herbaria, and, where appropriate, from the literature. A list of the species follows, and members with records of these are requested to send them to Dr A. J. E. 15. BRITISH BRYOLOGICAL SOCIETY HERBARIUM

It is estimated that the B.B.S. Herbarium contains about 22,000 packets of mosses and liverworts. The majority of these are British, and are the voucher specimens from the British vice-counties. The herbarium is continually growing in size from donations, collections left by individual bryologists, and

by the annual addition of vice-county record vouchers. Thus it is an invaluable source of material for workers studying variation, ecology and distribution.

17. INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATION FOR STANDARDIZATION AND B.B.S. BULLETINS

The adoption of ISO paper sizes in Great Britain is part of a general move towards rationalization which will result in the metric system being used by all industrial nations of the world. Rationalization of paper sizes will lead to economies both for paper manufacturers and for all trades where paper is an important raw material: wastefulness will be reduced. The basis of ISO sizes is the ratio of $1:\sqrt{2}$ (1.414), i.e. the only ratio between the long and short dimensions of sheet which remains unchanged when the sheet is cut or folded in half parallel to the shorter dimension. The principal letterheading ISO size is A4, which falls between (and is intended to replace) the traditional quarto and foolscap sheets. A5 replaces the octavo sheet.

With the production of the present Bulletin a move is being made towards this standardization. The page size adopted is A5 (148 \times 210 mm), i.e. folded A4 (210 \times 297 mm), and it is hoped that members approve the change. The Secretary would be pleased to hear from anyone with views on this, or indeed on any topic concerned with the Bulletin.
