# New non-flowering plant group in North Wales

A new group has been set up in North Wales that plans to arrange field meetings to study non-flowering plants – initially, at least, concentrating on bryophytes, lichens and pteridophytes.

The first meeting was held at the Pensychnant Environmental Centre, near Conwy, on 4 August 2010, the major objectives being to meet people in the area interested in 'lower plants' and to plan further meetings, in addition to a little field work of course.


The group hope to attract a wide range of expertise, from absolute beginners to experts, and to encourage a greater interest in these plants.

There are no plans at this stage to establish any formal structure for the group, although it is hoped that it will eventually become a branch of the North Wales Wildlife Trust, with frequent meetings throughout the year, giving help and support to the many beginners who have taken an interest in lichens, bryophytes, and ferns, etc., but need more encouragement. Although rich in species, the region is under-recorded, and a great deal needs to be done to address this problem.

## Atlas of the Bryophytes of South Hampshire – Rod Stern

The first flora of South Hampshire, an area of southern England that includes the New Forest, was published in 1961 by Jean Paton. Since then, a significant amount of



data has been collected, and this has now been collated by Rod Stern in this up-to-date atlas. In addition to the new data, the 140-pp. book contains a reproduction of Jean's original 1961 flora. My-Plant.org is a new social networking community for plant biologists and all other interested parties to come together to share information, collaborate and stay on top of the latest developments in plant science.

The network is organized based on the phylogeny of plants so that users can easily gather around clades of interest related to various species and groups of species. As such, members and visitors can browse the network and follow the relationships between clades to discover new communities and develop collaborations related to their own work.

My-Plant.org is more than just another social networking site. It also provides integration and links with other sites, tools and repositories of information. It is free to join, supported as it is by the US National Science Foundation iPlant Collaborative. At the time of writing, bryophytes are not very well represented, so visit the site, join and find out what this botanical 'Facebook' is all about.

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## The Mosses and Liverworts of Pembrokeshire – Sam Bosanquet

The western county of Pembrokeshire in Wales has a tremendous diversity of habitats, including dramatic coasts, steep-sided valleys, tors and 'Mediterranean' hotspots. This new flora celebrates the county by looking at the distribution and behaviour of the bryophytes that give each habitat its own subtly different appearance. Each species account has been written in a colloquial style, drawing on the author's experience of the plants not only in Pembrokeshire since recording started in 2000, but also further afield.


This area comprises much of Ursula Duncan's old stamping ground, which was last surveyed pre-1963. The centre for the week will be Brechin where there are 22 under-recorded hectads stretching from the coast and lowland areas around Forfar to the high ground of Mount Keen, Mount Battock and the upper reaches of the Water of Mark. There are also some better known sites worthy of a visit, such as The Burn and North Esk. In addition, even within the better recorded areas, there are a number of old records which are not localized within the hectads and which it would be useful to re-find.
