
Mugshots please

Monitoring the effects of ash die-back disease

The spread of ash die-back disease has been widely publicized in the last year. Several organisations (Botanical Society of Britain and Ireland, British Bryological Society, British Lichen Society, Centre for Ecology and Hydrology) have been developing plans for a co-ordinated survey to monitor the effect of the disease on vascular plants, bryophytes and lichens over the coming years. Defra and NERC have agreed to fund a pilot survey. We will be testing the methods and the draft recording card in the next few weeks. The methods will be relatively simple – to summarise very briefly, recorders will be asked to record the bryophytes on 10 ash trees and 10 trees of other species at each site surveyed. We will be contacting Regional Recorders directly, but we would like to hear from all other members who would be interested in taking part in this survey. We will provide further details in subsequent issues of *Field Bryology*.

Cheddar Gorge is justly famous for its spectacular limestone cliffs but it is also very rich in bryophytes. We will visit limestone woodland, grassland and old lead workings in the upper gorge (Black Rock area) and see a wide range of characteristic limestone mosses and liverworts as well as some of the more locally uncommon e.g. *Porella arboris-vitae*, *Seligeria pusilla, Entosthodon muhlenbergii, Bryoerythrophyllum ferruginascens* and *Anomobryum concinnatum*. All levels of expertise are welcome.

Spring 2014 Field Meeting, Rolvenden, 17th-22nd April 2014

This meeting will straddle the border between East Sussex and East Kent, an area which appears to be rather under-recorded, notwithstanding the long history of distinguished botanists who have graced vice counties 14 and 15. Although East Sussex, in particular, has a good bryophyte flora on sandstone, this has been well-documented and we won't officially be going to any of the classic sites there. But there will, however, be an opportunity to go to Fairlight Glen since we will be so close to it and where there are still fine colonies of *Dumortiera hirsuta* and *Tortula freibergii* to be seen. A thorn-proof group will be recruited to refind *Calyptrochaeta apiculata* in nearby Covehurst Wood. Most of the effort will be directed at finding more common species than these. We will go to Rye Harbour to look at stabilised shingle and lake margins as well as making a visit to Camber Castle. We will study woodland, churchyards, chalk downland, coastal habitats and even pavements. One moss that has plenty of old records in this area is *Atrichum angustatum*; it would be really good if we could refind it and we'll be going to some of its old haunts to try. The event centre will be in Rolvenden, but the details are still being finalised. A list of accommodation will be made available on the BBS website and there should be a good choice, although these dates do encompass the Easter Weekend so early booking is going to be advisable.

We will visit Clara Bog, identified in the Irish Red Data Book as an Important Bryophyte Area and one of the best raised bogs remaining in Ireland. Highlights will include flushes, bog woodland and lots of *Sphagnum*. We will try to refind *Tetraplodon angustatus*, recorded here in 1988 in its only Irish station. This meeting will explore the area around the mountain of Mweelrea (c 815m). On Saturday, weather allowing, the large corrie to the northwest of Doo Lough will be explored. An effort will be made to refind a number of species, including *Ptilium crista-castrensis* (in its only Irish locality) and *Scapania nimbosa*. A range of rare montane and oceanic species will be seen, including excellent examples of hepatic mat vegetation and abundant *Sphagnum skyense*. Sites to be visited on Sunday will include the machair at Dooaghtry, where *Petalophyllum ralfsii* and *Catoscopium nigritum* are known. Louisburgh is the nearest village, but accommodation is limited, so it may be better to stay in Westport.

The Breadalbane hills, and particularly the Ben Lawers area, were much visited by a previous generation of bryologists and have a wonderful bryophyte flora. The last visit by the BBS to the area was in 1981 and since then the hills have been rather neglected in favour of less well-recorded areas. This means that many bryologists are now unfamiliar with the assemblage of montane species of calcareous rocks, which are a feature of the area. The aim of this meeting is to go a little way towards rectifying that situation. So, the primary aim, weather permitting, is to visit a selection of these hills and to look at a range of species which are either absent or very rare elsewhere in the UK. It is a montane meeting and although the distances involved are not great, it will involve walking uphill, sometimes over rough and steep terrain, to reach the best ground. The meeting will be based in Killin, which will give us access to Glen Lochay and Glen Lyon. It is hoped that the base will be self-catering accommodation but this is yet to be arranged.

BBS Orthotrichum Workshop, Dorset, 16th-19th May 2014

A BBS Workshop on *Orthotrichum* will be run by Tom Blockeel and Sam Bosanquet at the Kingcombe Centre in Dorset on 16th-19th May 2014. Dr Francisco Lara (University of Madrid) and Dr Ricardo Garilleti (University of Valencia), two of the world's leading experts on the genus, have agreed to join the workshop and their expertise will be invaluable. *Orthotrichum* is a fascinating genus, not least because new species are colonising our islands and others have extended their range following reductions in air pollution. A major objective of the workshop will be to stimulate searches for rare and incoming species, which are surely under-recorded. The workshop is intended for improvers and experts: you should at least be able to recognise a member of the genus even if you have trouble with the species!

The meeting will run from the evening of Friday 16th May until Sunday 18th, but there will be an optional extension on Monday 19th May for further field work. The expected cost is £180 per person for the main part of the meeting (Friday to Sunday), including dinner, B&B and lunch, and a further £90 for the additional day. There is a 10% reduction for those sharing rooms. Places at the workshop will be limited, so if you wish to attend please register as soon as possible.
