NMW and BBSUK specimen lists available online at National Museum Wales

Amgueddfa Cymru-National Museum Wales in Cardiff holds an extensive collection of bryophytes, totalling close to 290,000 specimens, including the BBS herbarium (BBSUK), currently with just over 40,000 specimens.

Documentation projects are being undertaken as part of an ongoing programme of increasing access to the collections, and the data are being made available online. These include checklists of the bryophyte specimens held in NMW as well as data for the *Sphagnum* collection and BBSUK.

The lists of bryophyte specimens held include all the taxa represented in the herbarium. UK, then foreign species are listed in alphabetical order with each vice-county and/or country that NMW holds a specimen for listed alongside.

A catalogue of BBSUK specimens is available (currently up to 2008), and these are listed with full collection details separately.

Also online is a detailed catalogue of the *Sphagnum* specimens in NMW and BBSUK (approximately 17,000 specimens of 85 taxa). The *Sphagnum Catalogue* includes notes on incorporated herbaria and exsiccatae, and the collections include a number of significant personal herbaria, e.g. those of J.W. & R.D. Fitzgerald, Paul W. Richards, Francis Rose, E.W. Jones and E.C. Wallace amongst others.

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
The Bryophytes of Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly – David Holyoak

This new bryophyte flora of Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly (in south-west England) has been published online at www.cisfbr.org.uk by the Cornwall and Isles of Scilly Federation of Biological Recorders (CISFBR). Open it by clicking on the 'Bryophytes' tab.

The flora is based on 48,532 tetrad records collected mainly by the author from 1993 to 2010. Comparisons are also made with 33,943

records made or assembled by Mrs Jean Paton from 1950 to 1992. The text consists of:

- ▶ Introduction, covering the scope and aims of the study, coverage and treatment of old records, recording since 1993 and presentation of data.
- Notes on species, covering hornworts, liverworts and mosses). The species accounts list the first records for each vice-county and comment on habitats, ecology and production of sporophytes. 625 maps show distribution by three date classes.



- Over 600 photos illustrate the majority of species.
- Two analytical chapters that examine coastal influences on bryophyte distribution and analysis of changes in bryophyte distribution.
- An extensive bibliography.
 - A PDF of the full text can be downloaded.

The CISFBR website also hosts the *Red Data Book* for Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly (2nd edn, 2009). This provides accounts of the threatened bryophytes of the same region and their conservation.

BBS on Facebook

The BBS now has a Facebook page. As with any aspect of the BBS it exists to promote the study of bryophytes and the work of the society and its members. Facebook promotes the communication between people with shared interests across the globe, allowing for pictures, videos and other information to be shared easily and quickly. This presents an opportunity to share knowledge, gain help with identifications and find links to bryological resources on the internet that you may have missed. 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Index of BBS publications 1896–2012

Some members may not be aware of the website www.pemas.demon.co.uk which includes a Cumulative Index of all publications of the Society, from the founding of the Moss Exchange Club (MEC) in 1896 up to the present day. It is compiled by Phil Stanley as an on-going work. It contains indexed items from the *Bulletin*, *Field Bryology*, *Journal of Bryology* and its predecessor (*Transactions of the BBS*) as well as books and booklets published by the Society.

The idea for the Index came from the late Professor Paul Richards and the late Dr Eustace Jones (Jonah) and Phil started work on it in 1988. Initially, it was to be distributed as a printed book, but this proved to be expensive. It was fortunate that, later in the 1990s, the web became generally available to members and it was decided that publication via this means would not only be much cheaper but also provide a means for routine updating.

Starting when the MEC was founded in 1896, the current version of the index (8.3) covers the period up to 14 October 2012 [up to *Field Bryology* vol. 107 and *Journal of Bryology* vol. 34(3)]. At present there are in excess of 42,000 citations and the file is in PDF format which can be downloaded from the website and searched. The Index is updated every 3–4 months.

The website also has a number of tables providing other details of the Society, for example the names of Presidents and Secretaries, details of Census Catalogues, and various individual special publications produced by the Society. It also has a set of Google maps showing where the BBS has held its annual Spring and Summer meetings since 1941.



Acrocarp Identification Workshop: Preston Montford Field Studies Centre 8-10 Feb 2013

An intensive mixture of lectures, microscope exercises and a short excursion will provide opportunities to study acrocarps in depth. Spring 2013 Meeting: Basse Normandie (Lower Normandy), France 16-23 March 2013

The meeting will be centred on the 'Suisse Normande' area, probably at Thury-Harcourt, Clécy or Pont d'Ouilly, small towns on the scenic River Orne in Calvados. However, at least one excursion will be made into Manche and Orne. It is an area of attractive countryside with tall hedgebanks (the famous bocage), large forest, deep ravines and some peatlands, plus a varied coastline with large dunes, rocky sea cliffs and landslips. Rainfall is relatively high, especially in the west and on the hills, the Collines de Normandie, which exceed 300 m at several points, but it is tempered by summer heat in the mildly continental climate.

The intention is to book a large holiday cottage to serve as HQ. Rooms will be allocated on a first-come, first-served basis and sharing of rooms may be necessary. If there is sufficient demand a second cottage may be booked. It is hoped that the cost for one week will be around €100, with meals on top of that. Later applicants may have to book their own accommodation. In March, it should be possible to find a self-catering gîte for 2–4 people for 1 week for around €300. Camping is also available.
